Dr. Levinsky Named Director Of New Evans

Dr. Norman G. Levinsky, Boston University chief of medicine at Boston City Hospital, has been selected for three positions at BU Medical Center.

The 42-year-old doctor will succeed Dr. Robert Wilkins July 1, 1972, as director of the Robert Dawson Evans Memorial, one of the world's foremost clinical research centers; chief of medicine at University Hospital, and chairman of the Division of Medicine at Boston University School of Medicine.

The appointments were announced recently by Dr. Lewis H. Rohrbaugh, director of BUMC.

Dr. Levinsky succeeds Dr. Wilkins, an internationally known figure and authority on drug treatment of hypertension. The search committee was directed by Dr. Vincent Lanzoni, associate dean of the BU School of Medicine.

A well-known expert in renal studies, Dr. Levinsky plans to bring the medical staffs of Boston City Hospital, BUMC's University Hospital and the Veterans Administration Hospital of Boston closer together. BCH and the VA are BUMC affiliates.

A graduate of Boston Latin School and both Harvard College (summa cum laude) and Harvard Medical School (cum laude), Dr. Levinsky has been on the faculty of the BU School of Medicine since 1960.

He moved up the ranks as instructor, assistant and associate professor, chief of the renal section in 1967 and the following year became Conrad Wesselhoeft Professor of Medicine, simultaneously beginning his tenure as chief at BCH.

Dr. Levinsky also is a member of a

Panel Discusses Health Crises in U.S.

"Health Care Crisis in America -- Real or Imagined?" was the topic for the February meeting of the New England Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, the association of American journalists, held recently at the BU School of Medicine. It was hosted by the BUMC Office of Communications.

Heading a panel of health-care experts and community officials was Dr. Gordon MacLeod, chief of the Nixon Administration's Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) project.

Joining him were the deans of Boston's three medical schools -- Dr. Robert Ebert of Harvard, Dr. William Maloney of Tufts and Dr. Ephraim Friedman of Boston University.

Adding additional input and questioning these administrators were a cross-section

of individuals closely allied with the delivery of medical care in both the inner city and suburbs.

They included: Dr. David French, director, Roxbury Comprehensive Community Health Center (RCCHC); chairman, RCCHC's community board, Mrs. Betty Wornum; Mrs. Thelma Moore, nurse, Boston City Hospital; Dr. John J. Byrne, surgeon-in-chief, Boston City Hospital, and his chief resident, Dr. Vincent Hennessey, Jr.

Also: Dr. Floyd Wolff of Quincy, a community physician; John S. Gracey, deputy director for administration, BUMC, and Alice Rothchild, a second-year student at BU School of Medicine.

Dr. Keefer Dies

Dr. Chester Scott Keefer, 74, internationally known medical leader, died February 3 at his Brookline home following a lengthy illness. Dr. Keefer was Wade Professor of Medicine, Emeritus, at Boston University School of Medicine and University Professor, Emeritus, at Boston University.

A former dean of the BU School of Medicine and chairman of its Division of Medicine, Dr. Keefer also served for nearly two decades as physician-in-chief of University Hospital and director of its famed Evans Memorial Department of Clinical Research.

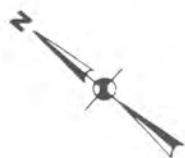
Boston University Medical Center honored Dr. Keefer two months ago by dedicating the Chester Scott Keefer Auditorium in its new nine-story Evans Memorial.

Dr. Keefer's widow, the former Dorothy Campbell, is registrar of Boston University School of Medicine.

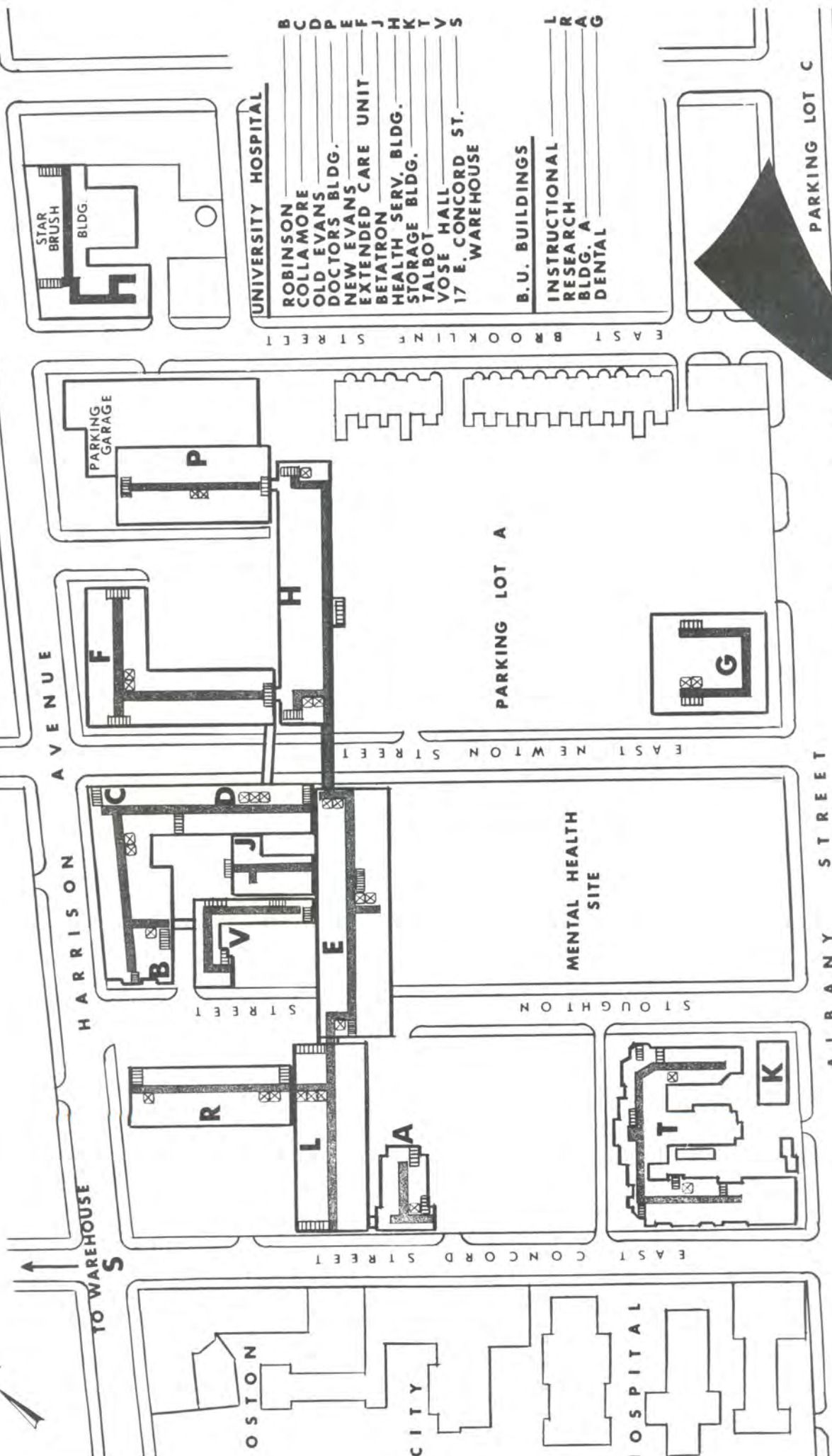


BOSTON UNIVERSITY MEDICAL CENTER MAP AND DIRECTORY

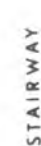

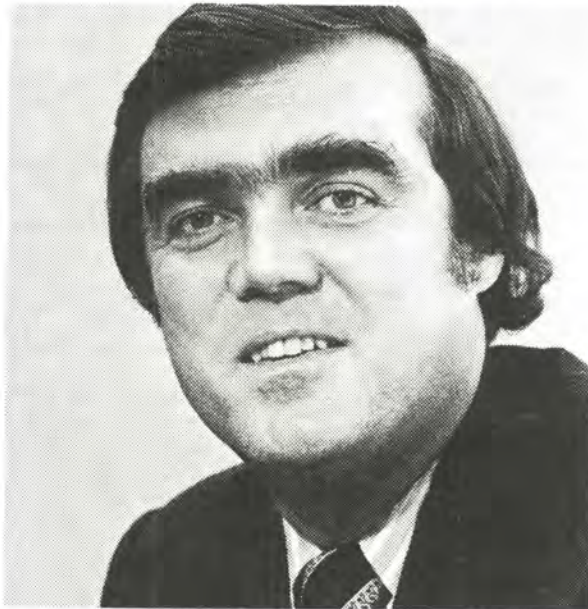
