The current issue of the *News Letter* was delayed pending developments of the Building Program at the Medical School. Now it is inspiring to see an actual hole in the ground, with steam shovels and pile drivers at work, giving considerable evidence that the Research Building is in the process of construction adjacent to the University's present School of Medicine at 80 East Concord Street and the Massachusetts Memorial Hospitals and Boston City Hospital. This is the first step in a development program which is to be followed by a new classroom building in the immediate future. It would appear that at long last, the face of Boston University School of Medicine is to be rejuvenated.

The construction program was started with the usual ceremonies, with President Case, assisted by Director Keefer, removing the first shovelful of earth. I expect that as the building progresses, there will be other ceremonies at appropriate times.

Did You Know That

There has been a slight increase in the number of BUSM faculty who are Boston University trained? In checking the latest Medical School Bulletin, 136 of the 519 members are BUSM alumni, or 26.2%, against 25.6% last year.

Sargent College Medical Advisory Committee membership includes Kenneth Christophe, '28, Wesley G. Woll, '50, Murray M. Freed, '52, and Samuel E. Leard, '42, as well as Dr. Bernard Bandler, Dr. Henry K. Bakst and Dr. Chester S. Keefer of our Medical School faculty?

The Massachusetts State Elks Association has presented a check for \$1500 to Boston University in support of the 7th Annual Institute on Cerebral Palsy? A portion of the program will be held at Boston University in cooperation with the Children's Medical Center of Boston. The Institute offers a series of lectures, demonstrations, and clinical experiences on current information and techniques in the education of children with cerebral palsy.

A Department of Stomatology was created at BUSM this past fall and the A. S. Berg dental clinic was established in the OPD of MMH as a teaching facility? The clinic was named for Mr. Berg who gave \$15,000 to help support it. Many other gifts have been received, including a recent one of \$25,000 by Mr. and Mrs. George Sherman of Newton Upper Falls for the establishment of a research laboratory to be in the new Research Building now under

construction. Set up as a teaching clinic, and staffed by prominent practitioners and teachers, the clinic will offer service in all phases of treatment for dental patients. Graduate students will be trained in the various specialties of dentistry.

A floor is being added to Robinson to house Haynes, which is to be moved in from 296 Allston Street?

John J. Byrne of Newton, professor of surgery at BUSM and director of the BU Surgical Service at BCH, spoke November 19, 21, and 22 before the Annual Convention of the Asociacion Medica de Puerto Rico in Santurce, Puerto Rico?

Martin J. English, former faculty member of BUSM and an affiliate of BCH for 51 years, died August 8, 1958 at BCH?

Harold J. Jeghers, former faculty member, is doing pioneer work in the establishment of a medical school at Seton College in Jersey City? He was awarded the Laetare Medal recently.

A device for testing the vision of infants and young children, which may lead to early detection of abnormalities in their vision and prevent blindness, has been developed in the pediatric department of BUSM and BCH? Dr. Sydney S. Gellis, professor and chairman of the department at BUSM and director of pediatrics at BCH, and Dr. John Gorman of Winthrop, a research fellow in pediatrics at the hospital, have found that most newborn babies have a 20-400 vision. The apparatus works on a principle known as "railway nystagmus." The research has been supported by the United States Public Health Service and the National Society for Prevention of Blindness, Inc. The two doctors plan to continue their research to explore color vision in infants.

The Law-Medicine Research Institute, first of its kind in the country, was established to conduct programs of research, service, and professional training in law, medicine, and the behavioral sciences? At present, the Institute is engaged in research and training in psychiatry, working with criminal courts, prisons, and parole systems.

In addition to training law, medical, and post-graduate students in psychiatry for work in these fields, the Institute is also involved in projects dealing with public health law and administration. The Institute's staff recently completed a study of the status of instruction in the medico-legal fields in all of the law schools of the country.

ROLAND P. WILDER, CLA '33, M.D. 1936, of Malden, Mass. has been elected President of the Middlesex South District Medical Society for the coming year and Vice President of the Medical School Alumni for 1959-60.

An electronic typewriter for handicapped persons has been developed in the pediatric departments of Boston University School of Medicine and Boston City Hospital by ALAN ZISKIND, '57. It can be operated at 30 words a minute with nothing more than a flashlight and a minimum movement of the head. The machine has been used successfully by persons stricken with polio and cerebral palsy and those paralyzed by accidents. The beam of light is merely focused on a photo-electric panel containing all the letters and symbols of a standard typewriter keyboard with rolls of paper which avoids the necessity of feeding sheets into the machine.
