Members of the Baler family of Brockton recently attended the dedication at Boston University School of Medicine (BUSM) of the Doris Appel History of Medicine Room and the American Medical History Panels, sculptured by Doris Appel, mother of Nancy Baler of Bassett road.

The Doris Appel History of Medicine Room contains more than 2,000 volumes on the history of medicine. Doris Leavitt Appel, a medical historian and sculptor, donated volumes from her personal medical history library, as well as photographs, letters and other memorabilia of historical interest.

The Doris Appel American Medical History Panels, formerly exhibited at the Boston Museum of Science, feature 27 figures depicted on two massive stone plaques. 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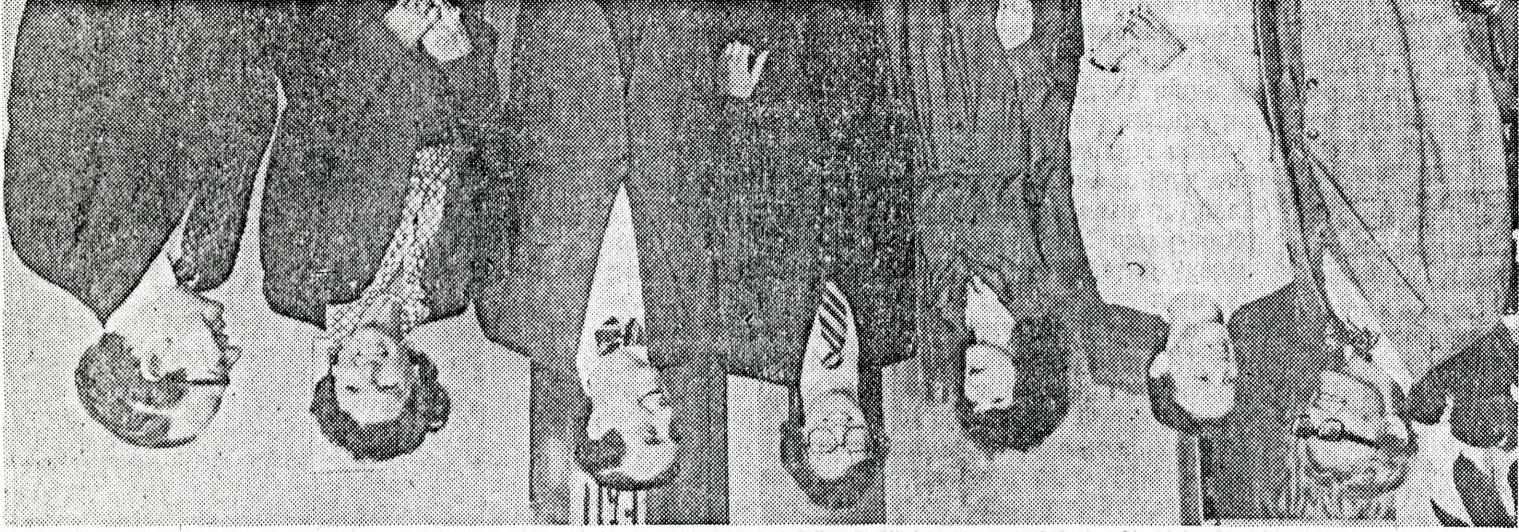
