HOSPITAL STAFF MEMBERS TAKE PART IN PRIZE DRAWING AS EMPLOYEE GIVING CAMPAIGN SETS NEW RECORDS

Support has never been stronger for any UH Employee Giving Campaign, according to Susan Siegel, Campaign manager. "More gifts have been received," she reported, "and the amount of the average gift has increased." At the close of the Campaign's third week, the Hospital has reached 78 percent of its goal, as compared to 70 percent in 1983. In addition, the Hospital has raised more than \$15,000 for the Hospital Project, surpassing the goal of that drive.

The new Lot A, across Albany street from the Solomon Carter Fuller Center, opened as scheduled to UH parkers on Monday, Oct. 15.

EMPLOYEES ASKED TO COOPERATE IN PEST CONTROL

With groundbreaking for the Hospital's Partial Replacement Project scheduled for November, UH will face an increased problem with bugs and rodents. These pests will be disturbed by the construction; while the pest extermination program will be stepped up to deal with this, the best approach to pest control is to prevent them from becoming established in our workplaces. Hospital employees are asked to cooperate in preventing pest infestations in the following ways:

--When eating away from the cafeteria, be careful in the disposal of food, wrappers, utensils, etc. Be sure that food is not left out and that sugar, coffee and other supplies are kept in sealed containers.

--Soft drink cans and bottles should be taken home. Housekeeping will be instructed to dispose of such collections.

--Patient food trays should be stored only on the dietary carts after use.

--Try to find non-porous storage, since cardboard boxes and paper bags are nesting places for cockroaches. If it is necessary to use boxes and bags, keep them dry and off the floor.

UH PHYSICIANS ASKED TO JOIN ANNUAL DOCTORS' RUN FOR THE AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION ON NOV. 18

The Greater Boston Massachusetts Division of the American Heart Association (AHA) is sponsoring the Seventh Annual Colonnade Doctors' Run, to be held Sunday, Nov. 18, starting at noon. Proceeds of the race will go to the AHA to support the battle against heart disease. The entry fee is \$6 and registration will begin at 10:30 a.m. at the Colonnade Hotel, 120 Huntington Ave., Boston.

Physicians will run one of two courses--2.6 or 4.7 miles--through Boston's Back Bay and Beacon Hill area. The first 150 physicians to register will receive an elegant brunch for two at the Colonnade Hotel after the race. Prizes will be awarded following the brunch.

NURSING CARE COMMITTEE SPONSORS LECTURE ON ETHICAL ISSUES IN NURSING

Anne J. Davis, R.N., Ph.D., F.A.A.N., a professor at the University of California at San Francisco, discussed "Ethical Issues and Nursing" with the UH nursing staff, members of the Massachusetts Memorial Hospitals Nurses' Alumnae Association and other members of the Greater Boston nursing community on Oct. 15 in Keefer Auditorium. The lecture was part of a two-day visit to University Hospital by Davis, sponsored by the Nursing Care Committee of the Anna and William Ross Fund of the MMHNAA.

The Nursing Care Committee was established in 1980 to improve nursing care through planned nursing research and educational programs. It is funded by a trust left by William Ross, a friend and advisor to the Alumnae Association. Anna Ross was a president of the MMHNAA.

The lecture by Davis was one in a series of annual lectures sponsored by the Ross Fund. Davis has served as a consultant, lectured and has written numerous publications on ethical issues. She is an Elected Fellow of the Hastings Institute of Society, Ethics and the Life Sciences and is an internationally recognized authority on bioethics.
