WINNERS OF THE 2009 BACH COMPETITION

Michael Jacobs, Honorable Mention recipient, grew up in Needham, Massachusetts, and began studying the violin at age eight. He will graduate in May with Bachelor's degrees in both Violin Performance and Physics. He will continue his studies in music next year at the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester, England. Mike has attended several summer festivals, including the Bowdoin International Music Festival, MusicAlp in France, the Cennina Festival in Italy, and Boston University's Tanglewood Institute. He currently studies with Professor Peter Zazofsky at BU.

Michelle Brune, Honorable Mention recipient, is a native of rural southern Oregon and began studying violin at age 11. She attended the University of Oregon for violin performance until, upon hearing the Walton Concerto, was seduced by "the dark side" and switched to viola. She has been a participant in the National Orchestral Institute, the International Chamber Music Course in Positano, Italy, the Karen Tuttle Coordination Workshop, and the Jascha Heifetz Music Institute for the Development of Personal Style. Michelle received her Master's degree from BU and was the recipient of String Dratement Honors. She is currently completing the Performance Diploma, for which she olds a Dean's Scholarship, and is studying with Michelle LaCourse and Steven Ansell.

Ku Yeon Kang, winner of the Graduate Prize, is from Seoul, South Korea, where she began to play the violin at age six. She holds a Bachelor's degree in music from Yon-Sei University, where she was a member of the Yon-Sei Sinfonietta and the Yon-Sei University String Quartet, as well as the Suwon Philharmonic. Ku Yeon has attended the Courcheval International Music Festival in France, the Asia Orchestra Festival in Japan, the Beethoven Symphony Festival in Germany and the Isang Yun International Festival in Korea. She has been awarded prizes and honors in the Eumak Chun-chu Soloists Competition, the Korean Music Journal Soloists Competition, the Seoul Philharmonic Orchestra Competition, the Strad String Competition, and the Suk-Myung University Soloists Competition. She is currently pursuing a Master of Music degree at BU, where she studies with Bayla Keyes.

Brandon Brooks, Honorable Mention recipient, is from Snellville, Georgia, where he began his musical studies at age 13 in his Middle School orchestra program. He has performed numerous world premieres as cellist for Juventas! New Music Ensemble, and has attended the Encore! School for Strings, The Cello Seminar at Music from Salem, the Icicle Creek Chamber Music Institute, and Boston University's Tanglewood Institute. Brandon holds a Performance Scholarship for his studies at BU, where he is currently a senior, studying with Rhonda Rider.

Nicholas Schwartz, Honorable Mention recipient, is from Brookline, Massachusetts. A Boston University sophomore and student of Edwin Barker, he has been studying the double bass for six years. He was recently the first bassist to ever win the Julius Stulburg Competition in Michigan, and last year he received Honorable Mention in the National Symphony's Young Artist Competition. He has attended BU's Tanglewood Institute and the Pacific and Aspen Music Festivals, and has been awarded a fellowship to attend the Tanglewood Music Center in the summer of 2009. He is also a member of The Hay Brigade, an acoustic blend of genres that has been featured on WGBH and BBC radio.

Jude Ziliak, winner of the Undergraduate Prize, was born in Indianapolis, Indiana, and grew up in Sewanee, Tennessee. He began his violin studies in the lowa City, Iowa public school system. He has attended the Brevard Music Center, the Texas Music Festival, and the National Orchestral Institute, and this summer he will also attend the Oberlin Baroque Performance Institute. While an undergraduate student at Boston University, Jude spent a semester at the Royal College of Music in London. Currently a senior studying violin with Bayla Keyes, he will graduate from BU in May.

BOSTON UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF MUSIC

Founded in 1873, the School of Music combines the intimacy and intensity of conservatory training with a broadly based, traditional liberal arts education at the undergraduate level and intense coursework at the graduate level. The school offers degrees in performance, composition and theory, musicology, music education, collaborative piano, historical performance, as well as a certificate program in its Opera Institute, and artist and performance diplomas.

In 1954, the College of Fine Arts was created to bring together the School of Music, along with two new entities: the School of Theatre and the School of Visual Arts. The University's vision was to create a community of artists in a conservatory-style school offering professional training in the arts to both undergraduate and graduate students, complemented by a liberal arts curriculum for undergraduate students. Since those early days, education at the College of Fine Arts has begun on the BU campus and extended into the city of Boston, a rich center of cultural, artistic and intellectual activity.

By University, founded in 1839, is an internationally recognized institution of higher equation and research. With more than 30,000 students, it is the fourth largest independent university in the United States. BU contains 17 colleges and schools, along with a number of multi-disciplinary centers and institutes that are central to the school's research and teaching mission.

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
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
