ACTS OF INCORPORATION.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

IN THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND FIFTY.

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE FEMALE MEDICAL EDUCATION SOCIETY.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—*

SECT. 1.—Timothy Gilbert, William I. Bowditch, and Samuel Gregory, their associates and successors, are hereby made a corporation, by the name of the FEMALE MEDICAL EDUCATION SOCIETY, for the purpose of providing for the education of Midwives, Nurses, and Female Physicians; with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties, restrictions, and liabilities, set forth in the forty-fourth and thirty-eighth chapters of the Revised Statutes.

SECT. 2.—Said corporation may hold, for the purpose aforesaid, real estate not exceeding fifty thousand dollars, and personal estate not exceeding fifty thousand dollars.

IN THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND FIFTY-SIX.

AN ACT TO CHANGE THE NAME OF THE FEMALE MEDICAL EDUCATION SOCIETY TO NEW-ENGLAND FEMALE MEDICAL COLLEGE, AND TO RE-ORGANIZE THE SAME.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—*

SECT. 1.—The name of the Female Medical Education Society shall hereafter be New-England Female Medical College.

SECT. 2.—All the government and business of said College shall be conducted by a Board of Trustees, consisting of twenty members. The present Directors—to wit, John S. Tyler, Benjamin C. Clark, Samuel E. Sewall, Adam W. Thaxter, Jr., Dexter S. King, John P. Jewett, and Samuel Gregory—shall be Trustees till others are chosen in their stead.

SECT. 3.—At the first meeting of the above-named seven Trustees of said College, they shall choose thirteen persons to complete the Board of Trustees. When the number of twenty is thus completed, they shall be divided by lot into five classes of four each, whose terms of office shall successively expire in one, two, three, four, and five years; and, at the end of each year, four Trustees shall be chosen for five years, the choice to be made by the sixteen Trustees remaining in office.

SECT. 4.—The Trustees shall have power to fill all vacancies occurring from any cause in their Board; to elect a President, Secretary, Treasurer, and such other officers as they may consider necessary; to make By-laws; to appoint Professors, who shall constitute a Medical Faculty; and to confer the usual degree of Doctor of Medicine.

SECT. 5.—This act shall take effect as soon as the same shall have been accepted at a meeting of the Female Medical Education Society called for the purpose; of which meeting, notice shall be given by said Directors, by publishing a call for the meeting in not less than three of the newspapers printed in Boston, at least six days before the meeting.

## ADVERTISEMENTS.

### THE ANNUAL TERM.

The Eighteenth Annual Term will commence on the first Wednesday in November, 1865, and continue seventeen weeks.

The Introductory Lecture will be delivered by Rev. E. N. KIRK, D.D., one of the Board of Trustees.

The Graduating Exercises will take place at the College, at 3 o'clock, P.M., on the Wednesday closing the term, Feb. 28.

### FUTURE ANNUAL TERMS.

To save the necessity of inquiry from year to year, it is here stated, that the future Annual Terms will, as at present, commence uniformly on the first Wednesday of November, and continue seventeen weeks.

### FEEES.

Matriculation fee, \$3. Fee to each of the six Professors, \$10. Demonstrator's fee, \$5. Graduation fee, \$20. The fees (except Graduation) are payable at the commencement of the term.

### INSTRUCTION DURING VACATION.

Students are required to study under the direction of some respectable practitioner of medicine, who will certify to their studies. They can receive instruction from any of the Professors; and can, if they desire, recite at the College-rooms, and thus have the benefit of the apparatus and library.

### TEXT-BOOKS.

The Students can select from the following text-books, preference being given to the first-named in each branch: *Anatomy*, Wilson, Gray, Quain and Sharpey. *Physiology*, Carpenter, Kirkes and Paget. *Obstetrics*, Cazeaux, Tyler Smith, Meigs. *Diseases of Women and Children*, Meigs, Churchill, Condie. *Theory and Practice* Wood, Watson, Dunglison. *Materia Medica*, Royle, Pereira, United-States Dispensatory. *Surgery*, Drutt, Cooper, Fergusson. *Chemistry*, Stockhardt, Silliman, Turner; Christison or Taylor on Poisons. *Medical Dictionaries*, Dunglison, Hooper, Gardner.

#### REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION AND GRADUATION.

Applicants for admission must satisfy the Faculty that they are of unexceptionable moral character, and that they possess a good preparatory education. The candidates for the Degree of Doctress of Medicine must have pursued medical studies, under the direction of a respectable practitioner of Medicine, for three years, including the time of attending Medical Lectures, certificates of which studies will be required; and must have attended two full Courses of Lectures, one of which must have been in this College. The candidate must sustain a satisfactory examination in all the branches taught in the Institution; and, at the time of application for the Degree (to be made at least three weeks before the close of the term), she must present the Graduation Fee, and a Thesis, written in her own hand, on some medical subject. The Thesis must be read and defended before the Faculty, if required; and it will be retained in the archives of the Institution, or published if thought advisable. Should any candidate withdraw her application for a Degree, or be rejected at the final examination, the Thesis and Graduation Fee will be returned.

In reference to preparatory education, students can enter with or without previous medical study. They are expected to have a good English education, and an elementary knowledge of Latin is very desirable.

#### APPLICATIONS OF STUDENTS.

Persons wishing to enter the Institution as medical students, or to obtain any information respecting the course of instruction, should apply to the Dean; letters being addressed to him at the College.

#### FREE SCHOLARSHIPS.

The Wade Scholarship Fund affords aid (to the amount of the Fees to the Professors and Demonstrator) to students, without restriction as to the State or country of their residence. Application can be made, personally or by letter, to the Secretary, Dr. Gregory, accompanied by written recommendations, from two or more responsible persons, as to the applicant's age, character, education, and need of assistance. Scholarship students are required to pay the Matriculation and the Graduation Fee; and it is expected that students who are aided by the funds of the Institution, will, if they graduate anywhere, graduate from this College. In case they go elsewhere to graduate, they are required to pay the amount of the aid they may have received.

Any person, or a number of persons, associated for the purpose, who may pay to the College the sum of one hundred dollars, will have the right to send one student to the Institution, free of further expense for fees to Professors and Demonstrator during her course of education, whether she attends two or more annual terms.

#### BOARD.

Board can be had in the city for \$4 to \$6 a week, according to accommodations. Students, who desire it, will be assisted in obtaining suitable boarding-places.

## LECTURES OPEN TO OTHER LADIES.

Any lady, desirous of obtaining physiological, sanitary, and curative knowledge, can procure a ticket to the regular course of lectures of any one or more of the Professors, at the price paid by the students, — \$10 for each course.

## NURSES.

Nurses of the sick can attend such of the lectures as will aid them in understanding their important and responsible duties; and, should there be a sufficient number to form a class, a special course will be given to them. A Registry of the names of those wishing places is kept at the College. No charge is made to Nurses or to the Patrons for the benefits of the Registry.

## SECRETARY'S OFFICE.

The office of the Secretary, Dr. Gregory, is at the College, No. 30, Canton Street; where he may usually be found at 9 o'clock, A.M. He will furnish, to those applying, copies of the Annual Catalogue and Report, and any desired information respecting the College; and, as he acts as financial agent, will receive subscriptions and remittances to the funds of the Institution.

## FREE DISPENSARY FOR WOMEN AND CHILDREN.

A Free Dispensary for Women and Children, under the charge of Doctress Cooke and Doctress Meriam, Dispensary Physicians, is open daily (Sundays excepted) at the College, from 9 to 10, A.M.; where gratuitous advice and medicine are given to those who apply, — the object of the Dispensary being to afford the students opportunities for observation and practice, and to benefit patients unable to pay for advice and medicine.

## REPORT.

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THAT women can successfully acquire a knowledge of the science and art of medicine, and successfully use that knowledge when acquired, is no longer a matter of belief, but of demonstration. Among the graduated women physicians in the country, who number about three hundred, and have all received their degrees since this Institution was organized, there are, of course, many instances of marked ability and eminent skill; and the evidences of the success of women in their new vocation are now accumulating year by year, while the conductors of public journals seem unanimously to take pleasure in giving publicity to facts in proof of this success.

Even in a pecuniary point of view, ladies are beginning to reap rewards beyond those attainable in other fields of female employment. Two lady physicians in this part of our State returned incomes for the last year of over a thousand dollars each, one of whom graduated from this College less than five years ago. Some of the graduates are securing desirable positions in public institutions: one has recently been appointed Physician, and Professor of Anatomy, Physiology, and Hygiene, in the Vassar Female College, Poughkeepsie, N.Y.; one held for three years, and another now holds, a similar position in the South-Hadley Female Seminary; one has given lectures on anatomy, physiology, and health, to the young ladies in our four State Normal Schools; two are physicians in hospitals for women and children; one, having taken the first prize of honor for her superiority in a class of eighty female students in the great Maternity Hospital of Paris, is now first assistant in that institution; others are scattered over the country, successfully engaged in their appropriate departments of practice; and three are instructors in this College.

Thus it appears that the education this College imparts fits its graduates for responsible duties, and that its diplomas are passports to prominent positions.

Graduates of the College are also needed in other public institutions, as well as in those like the above named. Especially should there be one in each of our hospitals for the insane; because here, to a greater extent than in ordinary practice even, must the male physician find it difficult or impossible to obtain from female patients that full disclosure of peculiar ailments, and their causes, which is indispensable to the best treatment for the restoration of physical and mental health; while the lady physician would, in this respect, naturally be the intimate and confidante of the female patients. So, too, should the female wards of our general hospitals, alms-house infirmaries, and reformatory and correctional institutions, be provided with women physicians. Such being the special positions, in addition to the wide public field, needing their services, there is great encouragement for women of talent and education to qualify themselves for the profession.

In this connection, the Trustees take pleasure in saying that they consider the College fortunate in having an excellent Faculty of instructors. Dr. Tracy, for the past ten years one of the professors, is a physician of long experience in practice, and a most thorough and systematic instructor. Drss. Cooke, a successful physician of eight years' practice, having given the highest degree of satisfaction as Professor of Physiology and Hygiene for the past six years, has now the related branch of Anatomy, for which she is equally well qualified. Dr. Aiken is a gentleman of fine classical and medical education, ample professional experience, and a superior lecturer. Drss. Meriam is one of the best graduates of the College, has had good advantages for practice in a hospital for women and children, and purposes to go to Paris at the close of our next term to increase her practical experience in the great hospitals of that city, and return with additional qualifications for the following term. Dr. Robinson, in addition to an ample previous practice, has the advantage of three years of surgical experience in the army. Drss. Dyer is well qualified for her position. The students may therefore rely upon receiving the best of instruction.

The number of students who have attended the Institution since it was opened is about two hundred; of whom fifty-two have gone through the three-years' course, and taken medical degrees.

It may be a satisfaction to its friends and patrons to know, that since this, the first Medical College for women, was organized, not only have others come into existence in our own country, but the first one in Europe was opened a year ago in London. The president of the association that conducts and sustains it is Lord Townshend; and the number of its influential and earnest supporters is an ample guaranty for its success.

In our last Annual Report the public were informed that the Trustees had commenced raising the funds for purchasing a building-lot, the City Government having offered them a square of 40,000 feet of land near the City Hospital, at the South End, for the sum of \$15,000, or one-half of its estimated value, in consideration of the object for which the land was wanted.

With funds raised for the purpose by subscription, and the bequest of \$5,000 left to the College (without conditions) by Edward A. Raymond, and received in January last, this land has been bought and paid for; and the Trustees return their sincere thanks to the friends who have put it in their power to secure this admirable site for the Institution. The lot is in the best locality in the city for the College, being within five minutes' walk of the City Hospital,—a matter of much importance, as affording the students convenient daily access to the wards of the women and children to acquire practical knowledge in the treatment and care of the sick. Many of them can, moreover, act as nurses or medical assistants while obtaining their education, and thus the two institutions be of special benefit to each other.

It now remains to erect upon the grounds a suitable building adapted for the present use of the Institution, and for its future wants when large classes shall fill its lecture-halls. The building will need to be not less than a hundred feet long by seventy-five wide, with the necessary rooms for lectures, chemical laboratory, library, an anatomical museum, a free dispensary for women and children (for the benefit of both students and patients), for a janitor and family in the basement (to perform

the labor and have the care of the establishment), for offices, and other purposes pertaining to an institution of the kind.

It is proposed to raise the round sum of \$100,000. The land requires some preparation by grading up; and the foundations of buildings in that locality, requiring piles, are somewhat expensive: and, should this sum be more than sufficient to prepare the land and erect the building, the balance will be needed for furniture and apparatus, and in fencing and improving the grounds.

It is intended to commence the raising of this building-fund of \$100,000 at once. Indeed, it is indispensable to do so, as the city, in selling the lot at fifty per cent of its value, made it a condition that a college-building should be erected upon the same by the 1st of July, 1867. No mention is made of its cost; but it is to be a building, "the exterior walls of which," in the words of the bond, "shall be of brick, stone, or iron; and the same shall conform to a plan of front elevation which shall be previously submitted to the Mayor and the Committee on Public Lands of the said city for the time being, and by them approved."

A hundred thousand dollars is a small sum when we consider the importance of the object, and the vast wealth of the city, the State, and of New England, to the people of which the Institution belongs, although located in Boston on account of the greater advantages of hospital practice in a large city. A number of wealthy persons have already verbally promised aid toward this building-fund. It seems very proper that the city that gave birth to the first Medical College for women should be the first to provide a building expressly for such an institution.\*

As the Massachusetts Legislature has, in past years, aided the College by pecuniary grants, as well as by chartered authority, it is hoped that the Legislatures of the other New-England States will also render assistance. Should any State make an appropriation to aid in erecting the building, the amount will

be credited as a scholarship-fund to pay the tuition-fees of students from that State. In other words, whatever grants the College may receive from the other New-England States toward the building-fund will be repaid in educating students from the States making such grants; the students continuing to be received until the amount is all absorbed. Thus the money will accomplish the double purpose of assisting worthy women by paying for their instruction, and providing them with a commodious building in which to receive their education.

Donations to the building-fund (in sums of \$25 and upward), made by *individuals* in the other New-England States, will also, in the same manner, be received and applied in the education of students from the States in which the money is donated.

Without relying on State aid, it is hoped that gentlemen and ladies who may receive copies of this Report, will, without waiting for a call, make known to the Trustees their willingness to assist, and the amount they will donate. Millions of dollars have been given to institutions in the country for young men: let now our women have a convenient and comfortable place in which to fit themselves for a most appropriate and useful vocation.\*

There is this encouragement in the matter of the building: it is the last heavy work that remains to be done. As the Col-

#### NEW-ENGLAND FEMALE MEDICAL COLLEGE.

##### *A \$100,000 Building Fund.*

We, the undersigned, being desirous that the New-England Female Medical College should be provided with a suitable building upon its newly purchased lot of land near the City Hospital, agree to pay to the Treasurer of said College the sums affixed to our names toward a Building Fund of One Hundred Thousand Dollars, provided the said sum shall have been pledged by responsible parties before the first day of January, 1867; at which time our subscriptions shall be payable. And, should this sum be more than sufficient to prepare the land and erect the building, the balance may be expended for furniture and apparatus, and in fencing and improving the grounds.

lege has now permanent funds to the amount of \$30,000 to help support it, and other bequests, to the amount of \$12,000, have been left to it, which, with a large increase, will hereafter be realized, and it will naturally be receiving more endowments from time to time, there can be no doubt that it will be liberally sustained after the building is provided. Indeed, the very fact of its having a suitable building, with ample and pleasant grounds, will attract the attention of the wealthy, and secure their favor.

As allusion has been made to pecuniary aid to the College from the Massachusetts Legislature, and as the friends who participated in the bestowal of those grants, as well as other persons interested, may like to know to what extent this State aid has benefited the Institution, a brief statement respecting the appropriations may not here be improper.

To present a complete view of the action of the Legislature in reference to this object, it may be remarked in passing, that, in 1850, the association (organized in 1848) was incorporated as the Female Medical Education Society; and, in 1856, the name of the Society was changed to New-England Female Medical College, and a full college charter was conferred, with all the powers and privileges of the other medical colleges in the Commonwealth. In 1854, a grant was made under the following Resolve:—

*Resolved*, That the sum of one thousand dollars annually for five years, from the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, be appropriated to the Female Medical Education Society, in aid of the medical education of females, by the establishment of forty scholarships, the beneficiaries of which shall be selected from the best qualified applicants from the Senatorial districts, in numbers in accordance with the Senatorial apportionment to said districts, to be paid in quarterly payments, the said amount to be deducted from the moiety of the School Fund devoted to educational purposes; and the Governor is authorized to draw his warrant accordingly."

This provided, as will be observed, for forty scholarships annually for five years, or two hundred for one annual term each. Of these, one hundred and sixty-five have been taken up, and thirty-five remain. They would all have been appropriated some years ago but for the fact, that, before the instalments were

all paid, the College had a permanent scholarship-fund of \$20,000 in value left to it by Hon. John Wade of Woburn; and many of the students have attended upon the scholarships thus provided.

The College was not obligated to take any State scholars after the expiration of the five years through which the appropriation extended. The expense of providing instruction for those who came was the same as if the whole number had attended. But the Trustees, desiring to receive the aid in the same liberal spirit with which it was granted, passed a vote that these scholarships should remain open till all were appropriated; and it is hoped that the remaining number will soon be applied for. Members of the present or of the incoming Legislature may know of suitable candidates whom they would like to recommend.

The amount paid for each student per term from the State appropriation was \$25, though the tuition-fees of other students were then somewhat more than that sum, and are now \$65 per term. This annual instalment of \$1,000 was applied toward the payment of the professors.

In 1855, the Legislature made a grant under the following Resolve:—

*“Resolved, That there be paid out of the treasury of the Commonwealth to the Female Medical Education Society, in aid of its institution, the New-England Female Medical College, the sum of ten thousand dollars, to be paid in four equal annual payments, commencing on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and fifty-six, — this sum to be applied in providing a suitable building, library, apparatus, and other necessary furniture and fixtures, and in otherwise promoting the objects of the Society and its institution, — and that the Governor be authorized to draw his warrant therefor, provided an equal sum be raised for the same purpose from other sources.”*

More than an equal amount was raised for the same purpose from other sources during the time of the payments of the four instalments. For the object first specified, “providing a suitable building,” nearly \$9,000 have been expended since the appropriation was made, including \$5,000 paid to the city of Boston toward the purchase of a building, which was used several years, for the College, with a hospital-department.

As to a library, the College has yet but a small one. Occu-

pying a hired house, and not having a suitable library-room, no special effort will be made in that direction until the new building is erected. Of anatomical and chemical apparatus and furniture, the College has, for present purposes, a very good supply, — near \$3,000 worth.

Of the expenses included under the general clause of the Resolve, "in otherwise promoting the objects of the Society and its institution," the item of paying professors, since the grant was made, has been over \$7,000 beyond the amount provided by the State-scholarship appropriation; and the expense of fuel, gas, water-rates, printing, and advertising, has amounted to more than the remaining \$3,000: so that, for objects specified in the Resolve, more than the amount of the State grant of \$10,000 has been expended; and for the objects above named, coming under the general clause of the Resolve, more than the conditional sum of \$10,000 to be raised from other sources has been expended. The various other expenses of carrying on a public institution of the kind, and promoting the cause generally will readily be understood, without enumeration.

The average annual amount of the expenses of the twofold work of carrying on the College and the cause has been something less than \$3,800, exclusive of the hospital branch, the entire expense of which, for the three years it was continued, including the pay of the Resident Physician, was \$6,859.28.

The pioneer work of carrying forward the enterprise through the first seventeen years of its history, against many obstacles, and under many difficulties and discouragements, has been done; and neither the labor nor expense of hewing the way will ever need to be repeated.

These grants were liberal under the circumstances, and at the time, and were of great importance to the Institution; carrying it through a period of its earlier history, when it was difficult to obtain the requisite aid from private sources. They, moreover, gave the College a higher position in the estimation of the public, and doubtless had much influence in securing the bequests and liberal donations it has since received.\*

\* In this connection, the Secretary, who was personally cognizant of the facts, cannot refrain from alluding to the important services rendered in the Legislature by the gentleman who is now President of the College. As a member of the Sen-

The undertaking to purchase a building of the city has been alluded to; and, as the Trustees now appeal for aid to erect an edifice it may be proper in this connection to explain, a little more fully than was done in the Report of 1863, why that building was not retained.

The Boston Lying-in-Hospital Corporation, having bought of the city a square of land between Springfield and Worcester Streets, erected on it, in 1854-55, a building for their purposes. They carried on the hospital for a time; but, not having sufficient funds to support it, they sold it to the city. The city held it for a year or two, and advertised it for sale. The Trustees of the College, after due consideration, decided to make a trial to purchase it. The price was \$50,000 in ten equal annual payments, with interest. The first payment of \$5,000 was made in May, 1859; and the usual bond was given by the city, selling the land and building to be used "for the purposes of said Female Medical College," including every thing pertaining to the medical instruction of the students, as well as to their practical training in a clinical department for women and children, which was specified in the bond, and accordingly carried on in the building.

The early efforts to raise sufficient funds to sustain the two departments, and meet the annual payments for the estate, not succeeding, and the war soon after arising, with its uncertain duration and unknown issues, discouraged any special subsequent effort to carry through the enterprise; and, at the request of the Trustees, the City Government, though kindly offering further to extend the time of payment, resumed possession of the property.

So the College, as its predecessor the Lying-in Hospital, gave up the estate: but, unlike its predecessor, it made no sacrifice; for the \$5,000 paid to the city was well expended, as it procured for three and a half years a spacious building for the College, with its clinical or hospital department, and amounted

ate in 1855, and one of the Committee on Education, to whom the petition was referred, he, at the request of the chairman, had charge of the application, and did much to secure the grant of \$10,000; and, as chairman of the same Committee in 1856, he took the leading part in obtaining the special College charter; and, having been appointed one of the first Trustees under that charter, he has been a valuable member of the Board to the present time.

simply to a moderate rent; something over \$1,400 a year. The College, in some of its early years, paid \$1,200 annual rent, without any hospital accommodations. The occupancy of the building enabled the Trustees to try the experiment of a hospital branch, which they discontinued at the end of three years.

The relinquishment of this estate has, moreover, resulted in purchasing of the city a square of land, of equal size, in a much better location for the College, and, as before stated, at an abatement of fifty per cent from its value; the city thereby virtually making a donation of \$15,000 to the College. A building much better adapted for its purposes can be erected; and the College and the City Hospital will be neighboring institutions, and natural auxiliaries to each other.

After the contract was made for the purchase of the Lying-in-Hospital Estate, the City Government fixed upon the location of the City Hospital on Harrison Avenue, opposite Worcester Square; and the importance of having the College permanently located near that institution (as the Harvard Medical College is located near the Massachusetts General Hospital), and the fact that the City Hospital would afford the students greater advantages for clinical instruction than any private establishment, were among the considerations that induced the Trustees to relinquish further effort for the Springfield-street Estate, and to discontinue the hospital branch of the College.

The undertaking to purchase that estate was well known to be an experiment (several experiments were tried before Richmond was taken); but the present movement is on the opposite plan: and the Trustees paid cash down, within the time specified by the city, for the new lot of land, and the building-fund is to be raised before the building is erected.

The Wade Scholarship Fund, as stated in previous Reports, is in real estate (brick dwelling-houses) in Boston, of \$20,000 or more in value. The net income the past year was somewhat diminished by the expense of repairs, and by a city assessment of \$201.50 toward the construction of a drain.

Of the Waterhouse Professorship Endowment, the \$8,550 (being the bequest less the Government tax) is temporarily invested in United-States-Government Certificates of Indebtedness; and the donation of \$1,000, previously made by Mrs. Waterhouse, is

still in the Boston Five-cents Savings Bank. The amount of the interest, and profit of the Government certificates purchased with the \$8,550, is, for the year, \$1,113.62. It is the purpose of the Trustees to add \$450 to the \$8,550, to restore the endowment to the original sum of \$10,000 intended by Mrs. Waterhouse, and then make a permanent investment of the whole amount.

As the collections by the Secretary and General Agent the past year (something over \$10,000) were mostly for the purchase of the building-lot, the College is now in need of funds for general purposes, to meet present liabilities and maturing obligations. Of the donations of the past year, those of \$25 and upward were for the building-lot; and the smaller sums, for current expenses: and during the coming year, while large sums and lesser ones, down to \$25, are subscribed for the building-fund, it is hoped there will be liberal receipts from the smaller donations for general purposes.

It is sometimes asked why the College cannot, to a greater extent, be sustained by the tuition-fees of its students. The class of women who have as yet attended are usually persons of limited means, like the female teachers in our public schools, for whom the State provides free education in our Normal schools; and the cost of board in the city, books, &c., is not a small item of expense. The largest amount received from tuition-fees in any year was \$700: it has usually been much less. It was larger in some of the earlier years, because there were then no scholarships for the benefit of students needing assistance; and, without such aid, many were unable to complete their education.

As the cause progresses, and it becomes more customary for young women to obtain a medical education, there will naturally be more students who are able to pay for their instruction; and many who receive free tuition will aid the College from the avails of their success in the profession. One of the graduates, Doctress Jones, has thus donated \$100 to the Institution within the past year; another, Doctress Cooke, who, as did the other professors a few years since, donated to the College \$100, has also given her services gratuitously for the past two and a half years as Dispensary Physician; and others at different times have donated various sums.

Thus the aid they receive enables the graduates to help themselves and the College also. When the graduates of a college increase in number, and thrive in business, and remember their *Alma Mater* in word and deed, its prosperity is doubly guaranteed. One of the students also, Mrs. Winslow of East Abington, of her own prompting, collected \$69 in her own village, and sent it to the Treasurer, without the expense of expressage even.

The Trustees return their thanks to Alpheus Crosby, of Salem, for a donation of medical and other works; and to Messrs. John Wilson and Sons, of Cambridge, for a donation of about forty medical pamphlets of their own printing.

On the whole, the past year has been one of the most prosperous in the history of the College; and, as the Trustees are now able to say that a building-lot has been purchased and paid for, they hope to be able to announce, a year hence, that the fund for placing a building upon it has been completed. And, with the expression of this hope, they respectfully present to the Patrons of the College their Seventeenth Annual Report.

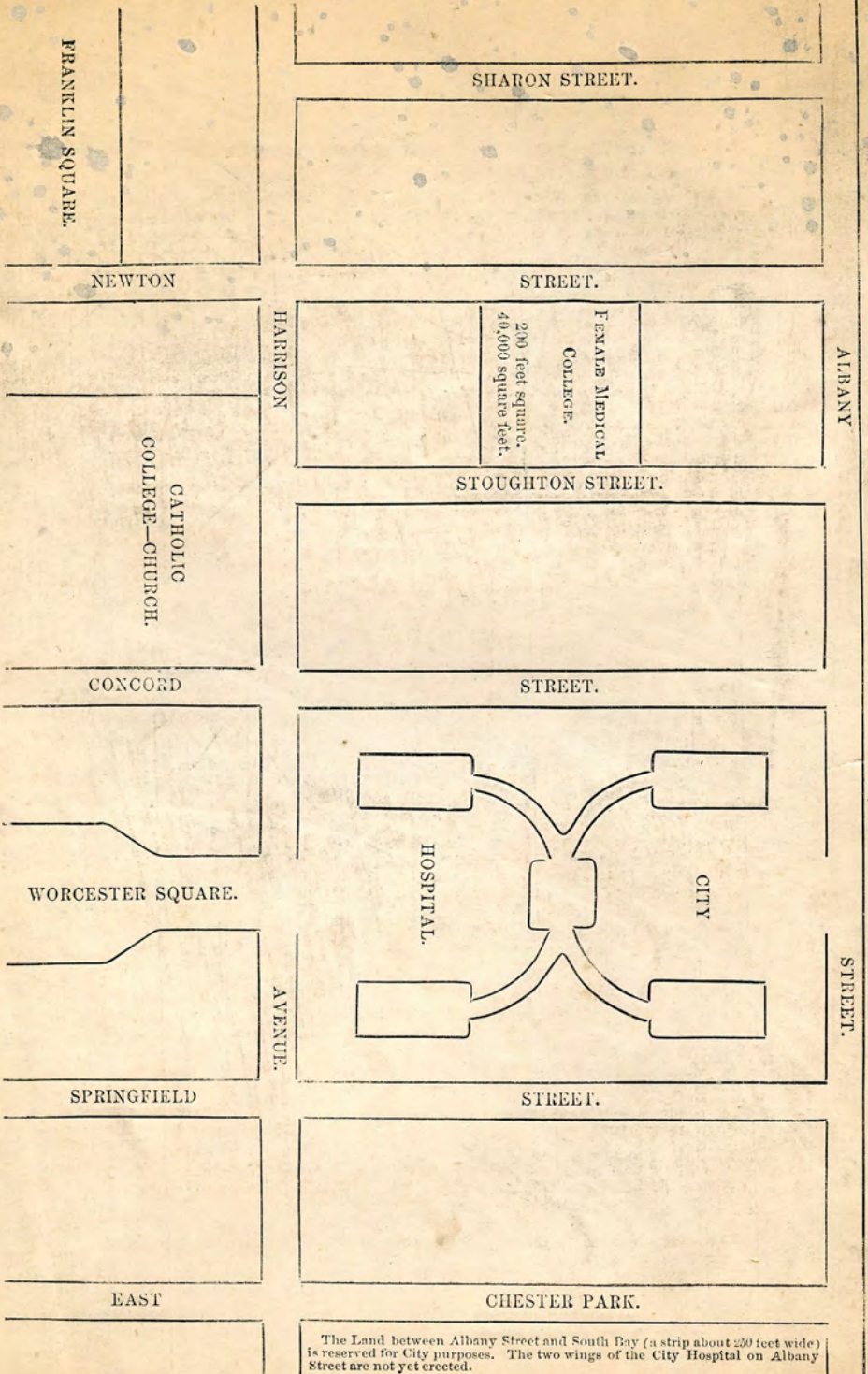
