SERVICE AWARDS CEREMONY, CLAMBAKE
AND 'LAS VEGAS' NIGHT HARBOR CRUISE
HIGHLIGHT UH EMPLOYEE WEEK, JUNE 16-20

The work of all University Hospital employees will be honored during Employee Recognition Week, "A Celebration of Service," June 16-20. The week's activities will include a Service Recognition Ceremony, a Barbeque/Clambake on the Talbot Green, and a "Las Vegas Night" Harbor Cruise.

The Service Recognition Ceremony in the Keefer Auditorium on Monday, June 16, at 3 p.m., will honor more than 180 UH employees. Awards will be given to employees with multiples of five years of service and such special awards as Most Friendly Employee, Outstanding Doctor, and Most Productive Employee will be given. Music will be provided and refreshments will be served in the Wilkins Board Room immediately following the ceremony.

Everyone will get a chance to relax at the annual employee Barbeque/Clambake, which will be held Wednesday, June 18, on the Talbot Green. The event is scheduled from 3 to 7 p.m. for day shift employees and from 9 to 11 p.m. for employees on the evening shift. Disc Jockey Bert Wilkinson of the "Music Machine" will provide music and the day's menu will include hamburgers, Italian sausages, steamed clams and more. Free tickets will be issued to each employee along with today's paychecks. Tickets and I.D. badges will be necessary in order to be admitted.

On Friday, June 20, the "Provincetown" will set sail from Long Wharf at 8 p.m. for the "Las Vegas Night" Harbor Cruise, the final event of Employee Recognition Week. Music will be provided by the "Music Machine" and employees will have the opportunity to try their luck on several games of chance. Cocktails and hor d'oeuvres will be served and door prizes will be awarded. Tickets are \$5 per person and are available now in the F-1 Cafeteria, the Gift Box and in the Personnel Office on T-1. Each ticket purchaser will receive \$2,000 in "play money."

In addition to these events, there will be two other activities in recognition of long-term service. A private dinner for retirees and employees with more than 20 years of service will be held on Monday, June 16. There will also be a buffet luncheon for retiring and retired employees on Tuesday, June 17.

CENTER FOR INDUSTRY AND HEALTH CARE PUBLISHES REPORT ON WOMEN, WORK AND HEALTH

A report which examines the circumstances that women encounter in the labor market and defines the health-related issues specific to women workers was published recently by the University's Center for Industry and Health Care. Women, Work and Health: Challenges to Corporate Policy, gives special attention to four women's health areas in which corporate policies are being reassessed: physical conditioning, social conditioning, reproductive capacity and maternity leave.

Women, Work and Health is the eighth volume in the Series on Industry and Health Care, edited by Medical Center Director Richard H. Egdahl, M.D., who is also director of the Center for Industry and Health Care, and Diana Chapman Walsh, director of program evaluation for the Center. The Center for Industry and Health Care was established three years ago as an entity within Boston University's interdisciplinary Health Policy Institute. OIS WINS TWO MACEACHERN AWARDS; '79 ANNUAL REPORT AND 'ONE WOMEN'S STORY' CITED

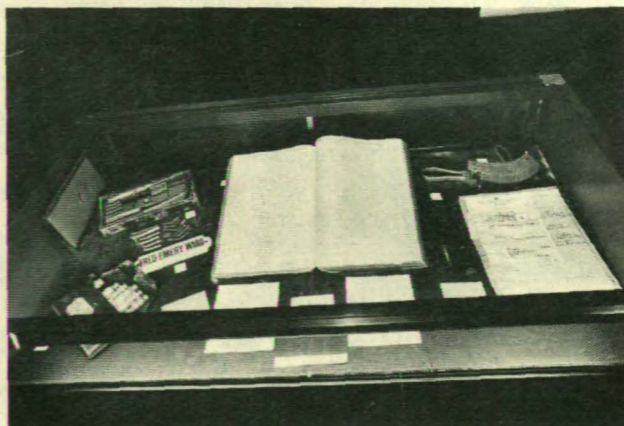
